Now in its third year, this event has woven itself into the fabric of our community, embodying the spirit of creativity, family fun, and local pride.

Looking to offer a non-traditional spring egg hunt, the insightful minds from the City of Mebane, in partnership with the Downtown Mebane Development Corporation (DMDC), created an event that entertains and encourages families to explore and celebrate our downtown businesses. The Downtown Mebane Eggstravaganza and Bunny Hop focuses on inviting children to design their own Easter eggs, which will be showcased in the windows of participating shops, establishing a new tradition incorporating art, festivity, and commerce.

Participation in this event always begins about a month out, with the Easter egg coloring sheets becoming available for the public to download from the city's website. You can also obtain physical copies from the Mebane Arts and Community Center or the Children's Department of the Mebane Public Library. This year, the coloring sheets became available on February 19, with the last day to obtain a coloring sheet being March 15.

After children decorate their eggs, they cut them out, write their names on the back, and drop them off at the Mebane Arts and Community Center or Mebane Public Library. Then, on Saturday, March 23, the Easter Bunny will hop through Downtown Mebane, placing beautifully decorated eggs in the various baskets painted on our local store windows and doors. The Easter Bunny will also be available for photo opportunities between 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. if you can catch him hopping around downtown! From March 23 to the 31st, the eggs will be displayed at local establishments, and we invite children and their families to search for their eggs.

What sets the Eggstravaganza and Bunny Hop apart is its ability to grow and adapt while maintaining the simplicity and charm that instantly

made it a beloved tradition. With more businesses joining every year, the event continues to aid in creating lasting memories for both current and future residents.

For our local businesses, the event is more than just a seasonal celebration; it's an opportunity to connect with the community, showcase their offerings, and remind everyone of the charm and vibrancy that makes Downtown Mebane a special place. No prizes are awarded for the egg designs, but the creativity and joy they bring are reward enough, highlighting the talents and imagination of our youngest residents. Recreation and Parks Director Aaron Davis states, "The City of Mebane Eggstravaganza and Bunny Hop is a wonderful event that brings patrons to our

Youth hockey group may be without a place to play

In an area of the state where basketball is second to none, sports played and performed on ice have increasingly become a hot commodity. Orange County and its closest neighbors have benefitted from the Orange County Sportsplex, which provides access to a quality skating rink for the public and teams, some of which have achieved state, regional and national prowess.

As one would expect, the rise in popularity — and lucrativeness — of ice sports has put a squeeze on the amount of rink time available to ice synchro teams, hockey organizations and people and kids just wanting to experience ice skating.

On March 6, coaches, organizers, players and families involved with the Hillsborough Hogs, the longestrunning youth hockey organization in the Triangle, learned the group may soon be without a place to skate. A letter was issued by Andrew Stock, general manager at the Orange County Sportsplex, announcing that the Sportsplex would take over all youth hockey administration, including registrations, essentially severing the partnership between the facility and the Triangle Youth Hockey North Carolina, which is more commonly known as the Hillsborough Hogs. The change would likely happen in Fall, 2024.

"We had been engaging with the Triangle Youth Hockey board for over 2 years about this topic and how we could structure recreational youth hockey ("house league hockey") to ensure that we maintain history, affordability, quality, and most importantly, access," Stock's letter stated. In our most recent meeting, the (TYHNC) board presented a revised plan that would not only prevent growth in recreational youth hockey, but a reduction in participants."

According to the letter, it was at this point that the Sportsplex decided it would not be in the best interest of Orange County for TYHNC to continue as the provider of recreational youth hockey.

The letter from Stock and the Sportsplex was not well-received by the Hillsborough Hog community.

Tom Deis, president of Triangle Youth Hockey of North Carolina,

issued a response that took umbrage with what he called "misleading statements" in Stock's letter.

"In the last seasons we have had the highest registration in TYHNC history despite limitations of ice availability," Deis' statement said. "Since TYHNC began running a house league program, we have never turned away a player interested in joining us."

All of that has happened, the statement continued, despite having TYHNC's average weekly practice ice time reduced by 1 1/2 hours.

"Knowing the limited amount of ice offered to us for Fall 2024/2025, we proposed restructuring our teams to be larger in roster size, but still maintaining the same number of participants or greater," said Deis' statement.

Deis' letter also said the TYHNC proposal referenced in Stock's letter was meant to be a collaborative proposal of ideas and suggestions, and that the organization initiated the meeting with senior Sportplex management "to determine how to best harmonize our various programs

to maximize participation." "It was never intended as a blue-

print for all youth hockey at the Sportsplex," the statement said. The Hillsborough Hogs were

established in 1980, and has mem-

bers spanning in ages from 6- to

18-years-old. The group offers a range of hockey programs, including beginner, house league, and advanced travel-level teams. The organization partners with the Polar Hurricanes House League to create a "House" and "Advanced House" division within each age group. "House" is for less experienced players with similar

hockey skills. "Advanced House" is for more experienced hockey players who wish to play at a more competitive level, but without the actual travel and cost associated with travel teams.

"We are the largest on-ice customer

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
